



4.08 JONATHAN HELPS DAVID



1 SAMUEL 19, 20

4.08 JONATHAN HELPS DAVID - TEACHER'S GUIDE



1 SAMUEL 19, 20

HIGHLIGHTS:

- 1) David was successful in leading battles for Israel and was well known among the people. Because of this, King Saul had become jealous and wanted to kill David.
- 2) Jonathan, King Saul's son, asked his father to remember all the good things David had done for him. But the evil spirit would enter Saul's mind and cause him to be like a madman, and he would, once again, try to kill David.
- 3) David was expected to attend a celebration and to sit at King Saul's table to eat. He told Jonathan he didn't know why Saul wanted to kill him. Jonathan told David he would help him.
- 4) For two nights of the celebration, David hid in a field. King Saul did not ask where David was the first night. But, on the second night, King Saul did ask where David was. Jonathan told him David was with his family in Bethlehem. King Saul became very angry and threw his spear at his own son!
- 5) Jonathan and David had a plan. Jonathan would shoot three arrows. David would be listening to Jonathan when he sent a boy to collect the arrows. If Jonathan told the boy to go farther to find the arrows, David would know it meant that King Saul would be after him. That is what happened.
- 6) David had to leave. He and Jonathan had to say goodbye. But they knew that God would keep friendship between them and their children, too.
